Dear Governor Reeves, Lt. Governor Hosemann, Speaker White, and Honorable Members of the Mississippi Legislature:

Under conservative leadership the last decade, Mississippi has made incredible progress in K-12 education. From historic literacy gains and record-high graduation rates to the largest teacher pay raise in state history and historic investments in public education, Mississippi leaders have accomplished much and should be proud of these achievements. Yet, our work is not yet finished. We must build on these accomplishments to remain competitive and, more importantly, prepare our students for the future.

As Mississippi business owners and employers, we recognize the importance of preparing the next generation of skilled workers. Too often, we find that Mississippi students are not prepared for the workforce when they graduate high school. This is a disservice to both our students, who are then unable to obtain or retain gainful employment, and our Mississippi business community, who struggle to find competent and reliable employees.

Mississippi has many great public schools, but even the best public schools may not be the best educational "fit" for every student. We encourage lawmakers to embrace an education system that puts the needs of students first, provides them with the best opportunities for success, and prepares them for life after graduation. *Private school choice policies*, such as those sweeping the nation in states like Arizona, Arkansas, Iowa, Florida, Utah, and West Virginia, *do just that*.

Supporting such policies does not mean we "oppose" public schools—quite the contrary. We believe strong public schools are essential to the overall success of our education system. In fact, that's one of the reasons we so passionately support private school choice policies. Research consistently shows that these policies strengthen the entire public education system. More than 25 studies show that the academic performance of students who remain in public schools improves when those students have more education options.

In business, we understand that healthy competition fosters innovation, lowers costs, and improves quality. The same is true in education, and Mississippi's education system should promote competition to achieve these outcomes. Our current education system does not; students are often locked into a specific school based solely on where they live, regardless of whether that school best meets their needs. Simply put, Mississippi's current K-12 education system could be described as a monopoly, where students and families often have only one

option. Such an environment would be unacceptable in business and should be unacceptable in education. Private school choice policies give parents the ability to choose the best school for their child and create true competition in education.

Further, recent data indicates that Mississippi's labor force participation rate is one of the worst in the nation. Fewer Mississippians are working, or looking for work, than at any time in recent history. This is not merely a statistical concern, but a reflection of the larger issue of employability and workforce readiness among our citizens.

State Economist Cory Miller has <u>written</u> that educational attainment is the foremost reason Mississippi's labor force participation rate is the lowest among states. We believe private school choice policies can help. In fact, <u>studies</u> show that such policies positively impact program participant educational attainment, which is a key indicator of future employability.

Lieutenant Governor Delbert Hosemann recently <u>wrote</u> that addressing Mississippi's labor force participation rate should be the legislature's highest priority this session. One of the best ways to address this issue immediately is the adoption of private school choice policies in the Magnolia State.

We are confident that implementing private school choice in Mississippi would lead to a more dynamic and well-prepared workforce. By providing students with education options that better fit their individual needs and learning styles, we not only enhance their immediate educational outcomes but also set them up for long-term success in the workforce.

In conclusion, as Mississippi business owners deeply invested in the future of our state's economy and workforce, we encourage lawmakers to adopt K-12 private school choice policies. Such policies will not only benefit our children and their futures but also the economic and social fabric of Mississippi as a whole.
